This course also explains emergency planning and management and the regulatory systems, documents, and directives that guide disaster response. Response factors, such as hazard control zones, resources, and responder safety are also discussed. | <p><u>Threats to Tribal Communities</u></p> <p><u>MGT-449</u></p>  | <p><i>Registration deadline January 25, 2022</i></p> | <p>mitigate all-hazards threats using a whole community approach.</p> <p>This course will include a practical exercise designed specifically to meet the needs of tribal communities. Participants will utilize the exercise to identify all-hazards emergency planning in tribal communities, and describe response and recovery considerations that should be included in tribal all-hazards emergency plans.</p> | |
| <p><u>Isolation and Quarantine Response Strategies in Event of a Biological Disease Outbreak in Tribal Nations</u></p> <p>PER – 333</p>  | <p>February 2 & 3, 2022 (16 hours)</p> <p><i>Registration deadline January 25, 2022</i></p> | <p>The purpose of this course is to provide tribal nations with the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to effectively detect, respond to, and mitigate a disease outbreak, using a whole community approach.</p> <p>This course will include a practical exercise designed specifically to meet the needs of tribal communities. Participants will apply the knowledge and skills learned through the exercise that will require them to describe zoonotic response plans, partners and distinctive aspects of emergency response in tribal communities. They will be able to apply lessons learned to implement isolation and quarantine strategies. Participants will select appropriate personal protective equipment and demonstrate the knowledge and skills necessary to maintain responder safety when using personal protective equipment while responding to a biological disease outbreak.</p> | <p><u>Course Location:</u> Mad River Conference Room See page 5 for details</p> |
| <p><u>Disaster Preparedness for Healthcare Organizations within the Community Infrastructure</u></p> <p>MGT-341</p>  | <p>February 9th & 10th, 2022 (16 hours)</p> | <p>This course provides information specific to healthcare organizations vulnerability to a disaster. During this FEMA sponsored course, participants will be introduced to the various natural, technological, and civil hazards to which healthcare organizations may be vulnerable and the potential impacts of those hazards.</p> <p>Federal guidelines and legislation that serve to aid in the preparedness for, and response to, incidents involving these hazards are discussed, as are current emergency management standards for the healthcare community. Participants review response and recovery issues that should be addressed by medical facilities and organizations in preparation for a large-scale incident, including identification of critical resources necessary for response and recovery.</p> | <p><u>Course Location:</u> Mad River Conference Room See page 5 for details</p> |

| <p><u>The Basic Incident Response to Digital Evidence (BIRDE)</u></p> <p>FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING CENTERS</p>    | <p>April 2022 Official Date TBD (24 hours)</p> <p>Registration through FLETC TBA</p> | <p>The Basic Incident Response to Digital Evidence (BIRDE) provides training necessary to any criminal investigator who may be a first responder in a situation in which computer based evidence is or may be recovered. While not being overwhelmingly technical in delivery, this program provides a sufficient overview of technology in order to adequately prepare the criminal investigator for taking proper steps necessary to identify, collect, acquire, and preserve digital evidence during the conduct of an investigation.</p> <p>Prerequisites: Applicant must be a law enforcement officer/agent with arrest authority in the prevention, detection, apprehension, detention and/or investigation of felony and/or misdemeanor violations of federal, state, local, tribal, or military criminal laws; Direct Law Enforcement Support Personnel (DLESP); or Employees of a federal, state, local, tribal or international agency who perform functions directly related to a law enforcement or Department of Homeland Security (DHS) mission but do not necessarily have the authority to carry and use firearms, make arrests and/or conduct searches with or without a warrant. This category of personnel may also include military personnel preparing for deployment. This is an entry-level course. DIRECTIONS: The Blue Lake Rancheria RTIC is located in Humboldt County, California on State Route 299 east. Take the Blue Lake Exit (Exit 5) onto Blue Lake Blvd. Turn right at the round-about and follow Chartin Road straight into the Blue Lake Rancheria.

Council Chambers: Council Chambers located on 4th floor of the Blue Lake Casino Hotel at 777 Casino Way.

From Elevator in Hotel Foyer: Take elevator to 4th floor. Get off the elevator at 4th floor, turn left and go almost to end of hallway. Council Chambers on your left.

Ivey Room: Ivey Room is located on the 3rd floor of the Blue Lake Casino Hotel at 777 Casino Way. From elevator in Hotel Foyer: Take elevator to the 3rd floor. Get off the elevator at 3rd floor, turn left and go almost to the end of the hallway. Ivey Room is on your left.

Tribal Justice Center (TJC): 1 Aeyekwee Loop. Enter main entrance Blue Lake Rancheria. Take Batwot Drive past gas station and continue through to Rancheria Road. Turn right at Rancheria Road through the open chain link gate. Straight ahead to the new Tribal Justice Center on right, near fire department (blue metal building). Entrance on north side of building where electric car chargers are.

Power's Creek Community Room: The Power's Creek Community Room is located on the first floor of the TJC. Please enter through the main entrance from the North side of the building. From the foyer, the front desk attendant will let you into the main building and provide directions to access the Power's Creek Community Room.

Mad River Conference Room: The Mad River Conference Room is located on the 2nd floor of the TJC. From the West side of the TJC follow the black metal stairs on the exterior of the building to the second floor. You enter straight into the conference room from the door at the top of the stairs. Please use this door to enter/exit the building.
